

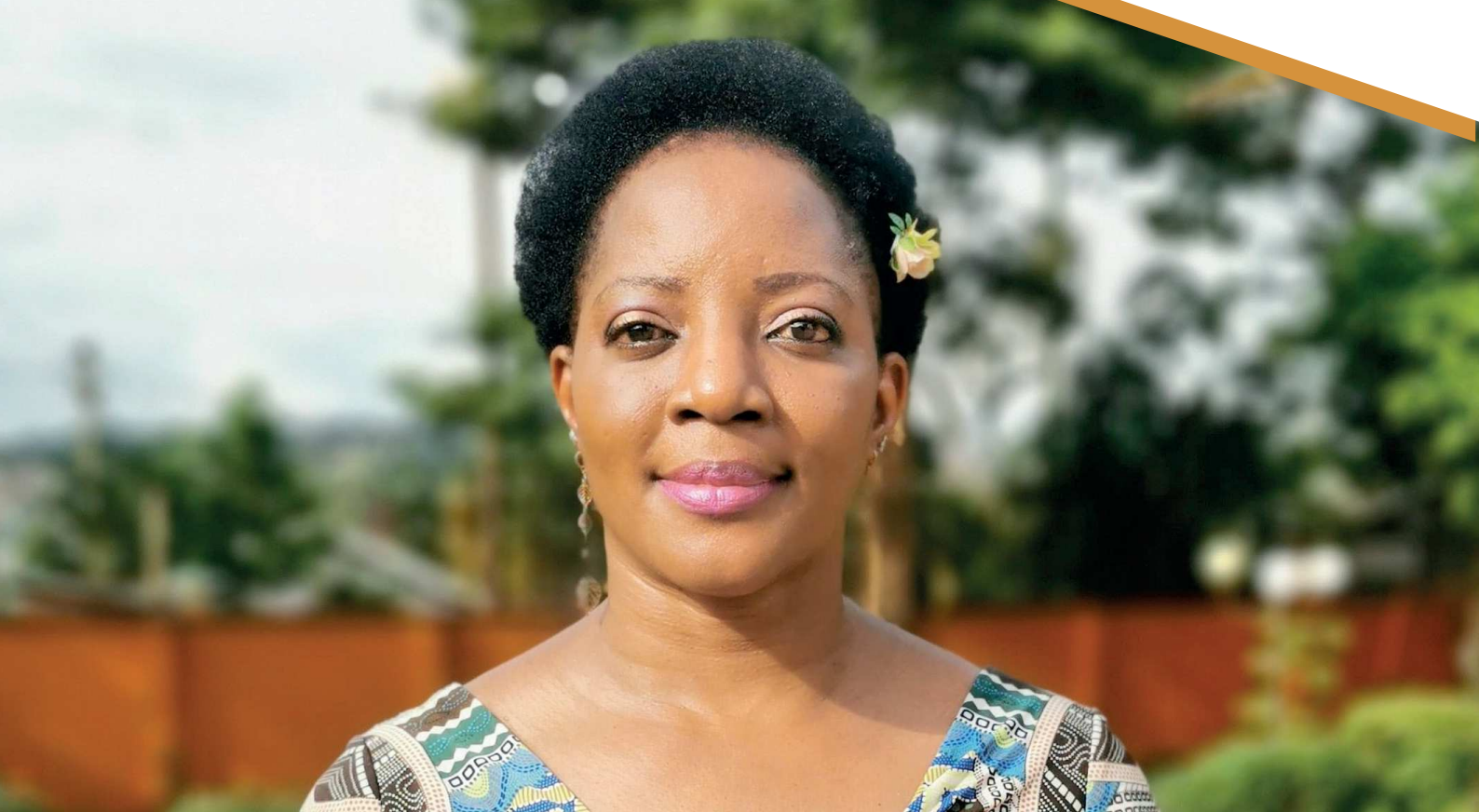

D9213 Unveils Boy Child Uplifting Programme (BCUP)



Rotary District 9213 has unveiled a new signature project, changing focus from the girl child to a rather unusual topic of uplifting the boy child.

The initiative, which is aimed at addressing critical issues faced by the boy child in Uganda, also seeks to reduce the number of boys dropping out of school, and remodeling boys into responsible men who can steer family growth and development.

According to District Governor Edward Kakembo Nsubuga, several studies and reports indicate that the exclusion of the boy child has had profound consequences on a generation of young men. The consequences, he says, are increased crime rates, low self-esteem, alcoholism, drug abuse and increasing school dropout incidences.

DG Edward believes that the boy child has lost ground and confidence, forgetting that they are the future fathers of this country. He adds that he developed the idea of supporting the boy child after establishing that today's boy child is very disorganized at workplaces, cannot be trusted easily and is often not reliable.

"As employers... we also identified this in our general meetings, that when you employ boys, the results are not appealing like when you employ a girl child. In most cases with boys, the audits do not tally like for the girl child, an indication that we have a very big problem with the boy child," Kakembo added.

He said the research he conducted with the Bank of Uganda towards the borrowers for SMEs, indicated that the default rate for boys is at 75 per cent yet 7 per cent of the defaulting females complain of the men being behind their defaulting habit.

Kakembo also faulted parents for paying more attention to the girls at the expense of the boy child.

"The boy child was abandoned and the concentration was put on the girl child to prepare her for marriage, not knowing that the organized girls will end in the hands of the boys who are school dropouts, who are thieves and cannot do anything for themselves," he added.

"As Rotary, we appreciate the girls for shining and trending in everything and we have decided to come up with this initiative to ensure that the boys are equally cared for like the girls," he said.

Rtn Jenifer Mirembe Sensuwa, the chairperson of the Boy Child Uplifting Program says the initiative will be sustained through Rotary's programmes like basic education and literacy, economic and community development that Rotary clubs and Rotaract clubs across the country use to reach out and impact the communities they live in.



Do You Need to Learn more about Rotary or Improve your Leadership Skills?

Here is what you need to know about the Rotary Leadership Institute-RLI

What is RLI?

The Rotary Leadership Institute was founded in 1992, some 30 years ago, by PRID David Linett, to assist in improving the Rotary knowledge and leadership skills of the future leaders of our Rotary clubs through a quality training and educational experience. To date, the RLI training program has spread to more than 400 Rotary International Districts in numerous countries over the six Continents because local clubs recognize the importance of training future leaders. The Rotary Leadership Institute is an unofficial affiliate of Rotary International, but not an official program of RI nor under its control. Many Past RI Presidents are supporting the RLI program and has encouraged Rotary districts to participate the RLI program.

RLI Mission Statement

The mission of the Rotary Leadership Institute is to provide an up-to-date, practical, and user-friendly educational opportunity in convenient locations for Rotarians identified as potential leaders by their club officers. Courses are given to foster leadership skills and Rotary knowledge with the intent to motivate the participant to be enthusiastic, creative and dedicated Rotarians.

Why Do We Need a Leadership Institute?

Leadership skills in a voluntary organization are often different than business leadership skills. It is important that club leaders have every opportunity for Rotary general education because the success or failure of our clubs primarily depends on the quality of their club leaders. Membership growth is dependent

on the quality of Rotary clubs, as clubs with good leadership are more likely to involve their members in exciting service activities and programs and, consequently, to retain their members and attract new ones.

The Institute offers a leadership course in three full day sessions (Parts I, II & III). Those completing each part are eligible for the next part. The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations.

What is the Philosophy of RLI?

RLI believes that having leadership skills does not alone assure good Rotary leadership. An effective Rotary leader must also have Rotary knowledge, perspective about where Rotary has been, where it is now and a vision of what Rotary can be.

What are the Methods of Facilitating RLI?

Course sessions are structured with as much discussion/participation as possible. Methods also include discussion groups, role-playing and problem-solving. Class size is usually 12-18 participants. Lectures are strictly limited. An RLI course workbook is provided to each attendee.

Who are the faculty members?

The faculty members are carefully selected by the Institute for their teaching abilities. They are drawn from all areas of our district and occasionally from outside our district. Many are present and past district governors, assistant governors, successful past presidents who have previously attended the RLI Faculty Orientation course and with experience in special areas. Each new faculty member must attend an initial full day RLI faculty

orientation training program and various periodic reorientation programs. The results of evaluations help the Institute to improve the course content and instruction.

Who Should Attend RLI?

Although any Rotarian may attend RLI courses, RLI recommends that clubs encourage Rotarians who have the potential for future club leadership, not necessarily just club presidents, to attend. The ideal candidate is early in their Rotary career and has a strong interest in Rotary and is prepared to be exposed to the larger world of Rotary outside of their club.

Rotary provides an opportunity for all of us to provide service to our community and around the world. The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) has a mission to strengthen Rotary clubs through quality leadership education. As Rotarians, you are already a leader in your community and in your profession. The purpose of RLI is to give you the skills and competencies to be an effective leader in Rotary.

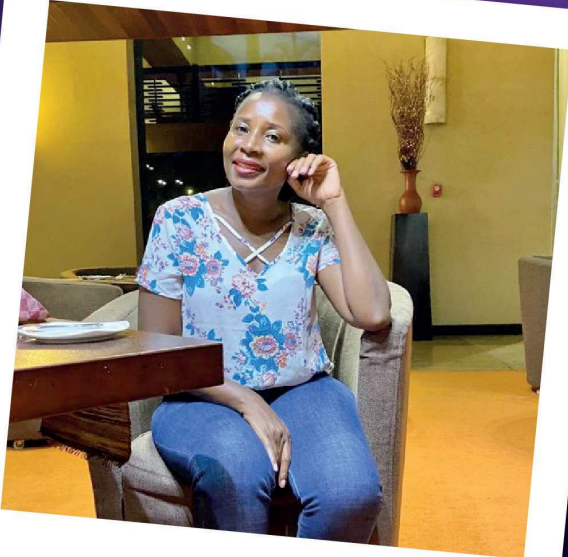

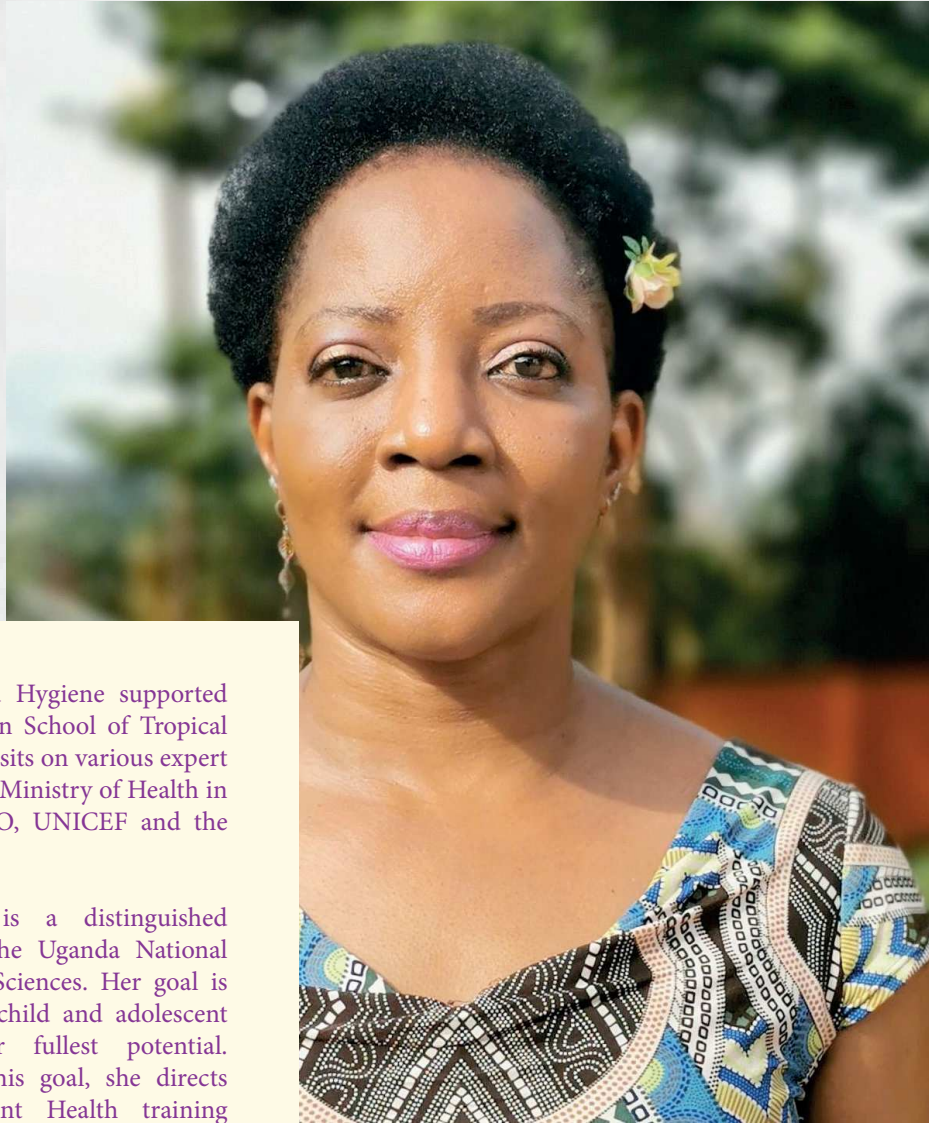

Speakers Profile

Sabrina Bakeera-Kitaka, MD, PhD



Dr Sabrina Bakeera-Kitaka, is a Senior Lecturer at the Department of Paediatrics and Child health at the Makerere University, College of Health Sciences. She completed her Bachelor of Medicine Degree in 1995, Masters of Paediatrics and Child Health in 2012 both at Makerere University and her PhD from the School of Biomedical Sciences at the University of Antwerp, Belgium.

She was a Gilead Fellow, and then Research Scholar at the Infectious Diseases Institute from 2003-2011 where she undertook a Fellowship in Paediatric Infectious Diseases and did research on HIV-infected adolescents.

Dr Sabrina has participated in epidemiological research and published more than 45 peer reviewed articles. She is involved in conducting basic research in various Paediatrics Infectious Diseases and offers clinical care to HIV infected children and adolescents most of whom are perinatally infected. She has contributed to efforts that improve Adolescent health care and training in Uganda, East and Southern Africa Region and Globally over the past 20 years. She teaches HIV in Adolescents on the East African Diploma of Tropical

Medicine and Hygiene supported by the London School of Tropical Medicine and sits on various expert panels for the Ministry of Health in Uganda, WHO, UNICEF and the UNFPA.

Dr. Kitaka is a distinguished member of the Uganda National Academy of Sciences. Her goal is to see every child and adolescent achieve their fullest potential. As part of this goal, she directs the Adolescent Health training program at the Makerere University College of Health Sciences and is the Founder President of the Society of Adolescent Health in Uganda(www.sahu.ug).

She has been involved in organizing various Scientific Conferences including the National Paediatrics HIV Meeting in Uganda; the Annual Scientific Conference for the Society of Adolescent Health (www.sahu.ug); the Annual Scientific Conference for the Uganda Society of Health Scientists and was the esteemed Co-Chair for the INTEREST22 meeting that was held in Kampala in May 2022.

Dr Sabrina is a Rotarian from the Rotary Club of Kampala Where she is serving as The Rotary Foundation Chair this Rotary Year.

She has been involved in organizing various Scientific Conferences including the National Paediatrics HIV Meeting in Uganda

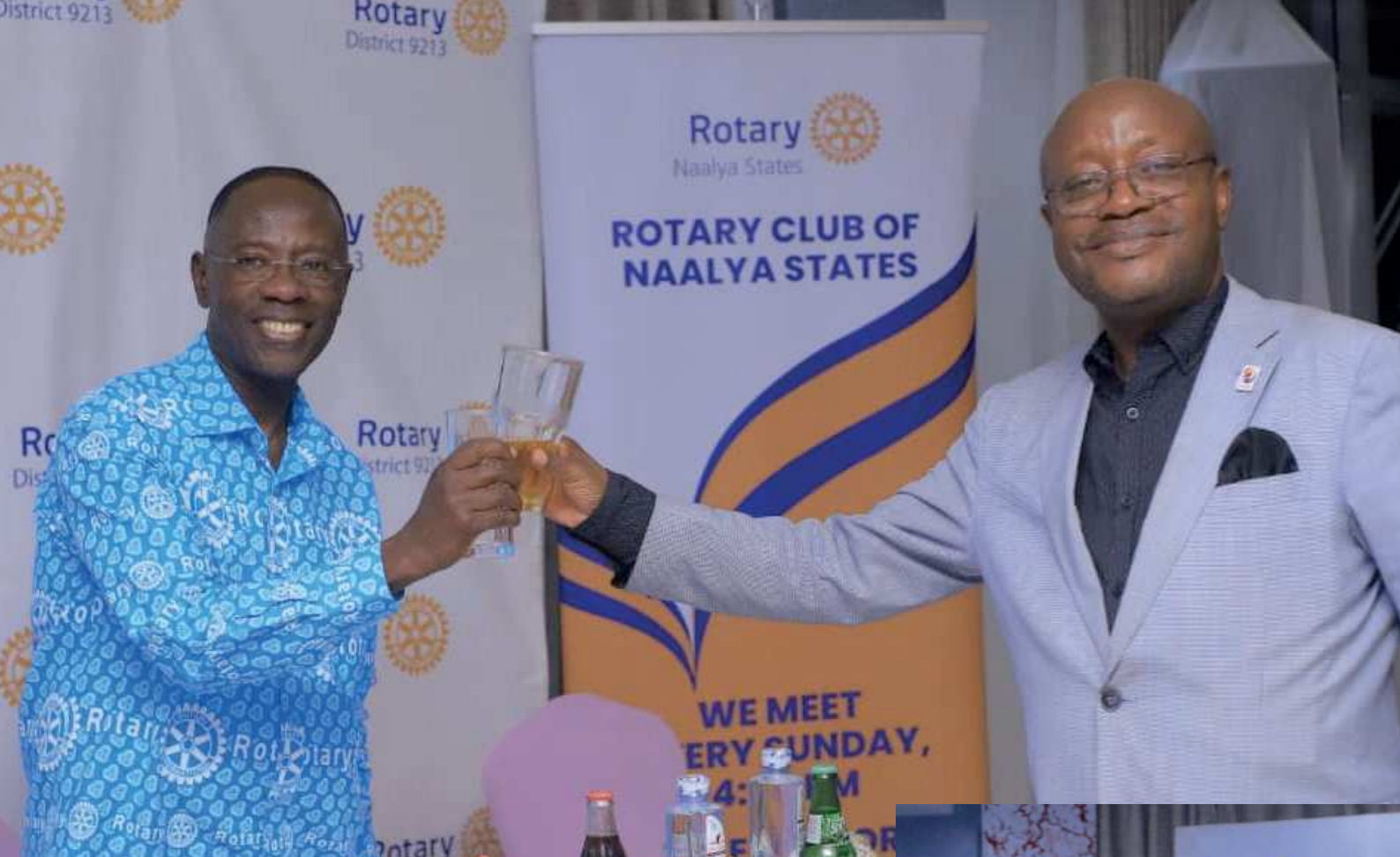

You will find vibrantly colored apartment complexes, sleek office buildings, beautiful murals, and StreetSide graffiti along their normal routes.

Singapore also happens to be a cultural melting pot where you will find people coming from all walks of life to visit the many attractions offered by the country.

This is just some of what the country has to offer;

- Gardens by the Bay –This is a 100-hectare area that is surrounded by plants and greenery. You will find the cloud dome

which has artificial clouds and waterfalls inside, creating a tiny ecosphere. You will find displays of different plants in their own artificially created habitat, and then the iconic sky trees that are used for their evening light shows. 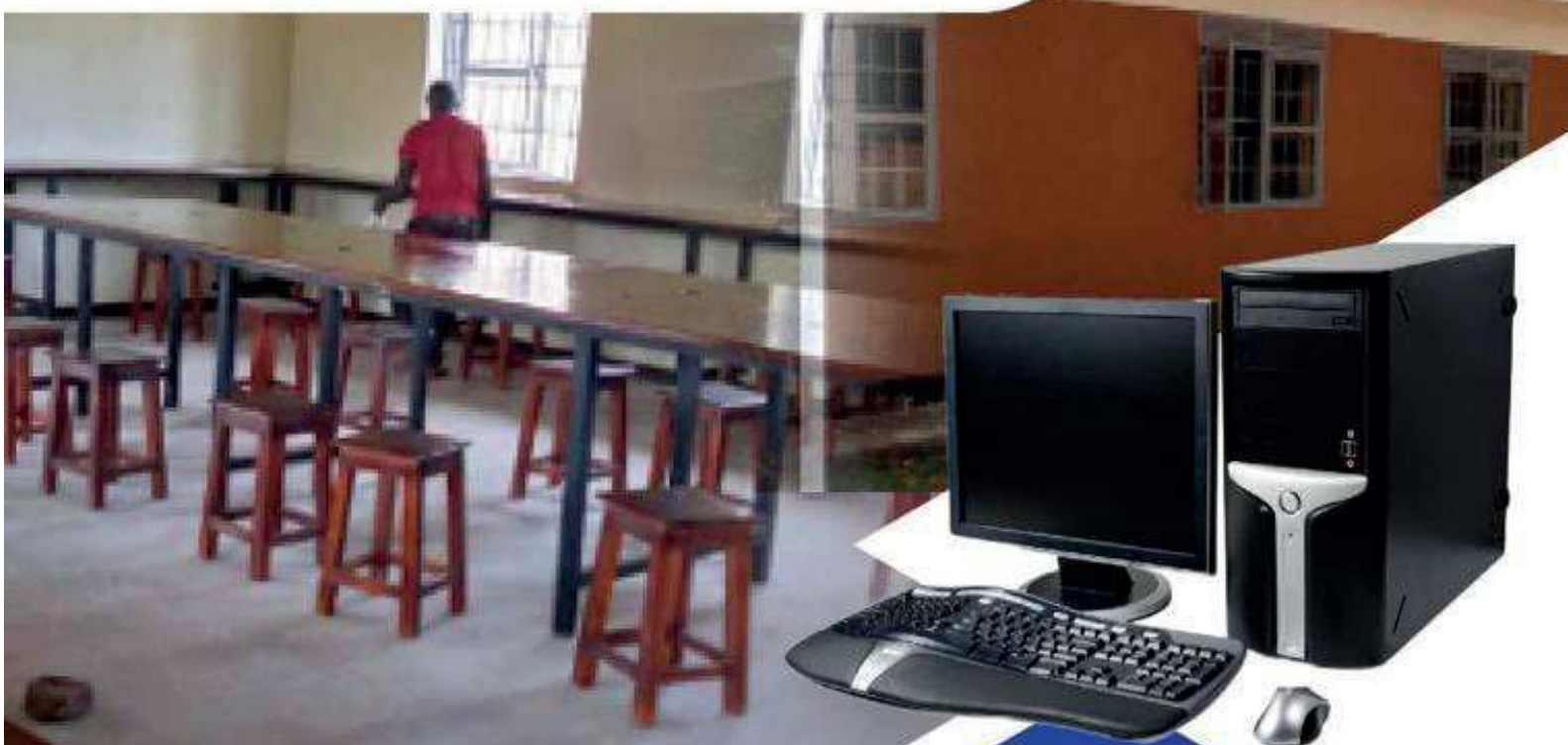

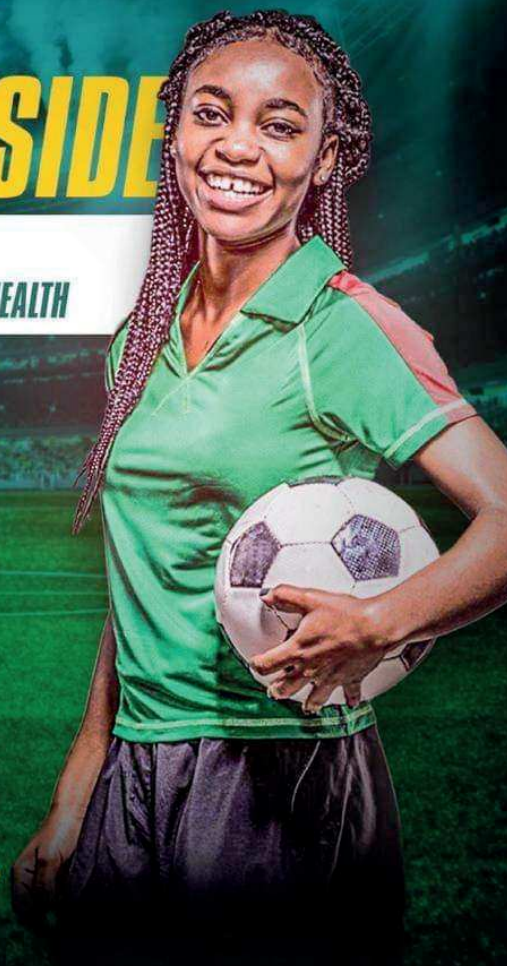
