### Rotary International Convention ends on an optimistic note, looks ahead to Calgary

fter five days of friendship, excitement, and cultural connections, the 2024 Rotary International Convention in Singapore ended with a focus on the future. Speakers emphasized Rotary's continuing mission to promote peace and goodwill and previewed next year's gathering in Calgary, Canada.

Fostering understanding was a central theme of the day, as Rotary Peace Fellows María Antonia Pérez and Clara-Valentine Tigenoah (Makerere University), celebrated the 25th year since the Rotary Peace Centers program was announced.

"To believe in peace is to have hope, and to do so, one must be both stubborn and optimistic, and be eager to persist and make a difference," they said.

Rotary International President Gordon R. McInally emphasized Rotary's long-standing commitment to building peace and noted that the topic has been a key interest almost since Rotary began.

"Our dedication to building a more peaceful world has its ups and downs, but it has been a critical part of how we define ourselves, going back even before the First World War," McInally

said. "From our earliest days, we have always had a vision of our organization as something more than just the people we see right in front of us and the direct results of our service projects."



The day's breakout sessions included even more discussion of peacebuilding, with topics such as Innovating Peace Education in Times of Crisis and Understanding the Global Peace Index.

Two breakout sessions focused on starting new clubs. During the session Rotary Your Way: Form the Club You Always Wanted, people learned key steps in the process, from finding a champion to help organize the club to choosing the club's leaders.

Speakers emphasized that cause-based and interest-based

clubs are a popular way to attract new members, noting that clubs can be formed among alumni of the same school, professionals in similar fields, or people who want to address a particular problem. As the 2024 convention ended,

> people began thinking about when the global Rotary community would gather again to share experiences, get ideas, and connect with friends. "There are few moments more magical in Rotary than attending a convention," said Bryn Styles, chair of the 2025 Calgary Convention Committee and a member of the Rotary Club of Barrie-Huronia, Ontario, Canada.

Calgary is home
to people of more than
240 ethnicities who speak
165 languages, Styles said.
He also touted the worldfamous Calgary Stampede,
which will begin several
days after the convention
ends.

"While in Calgary, you will be mere moments away from the stunning Rocky Mountains, soaking in the majesty of the natural beauty all around you," Styles said. "Within driving distance of Calgary, you can find not one, but six UNESCO sites, including Waterton-Glacier [International] Peace Park," which Rotarians helped establish.

This meant that Thursday wouldn't be a productive day for most of us that stayed in the bar till morning.

My colleague had noticed my unproductive behaviour on Thursdays. She invited me and challenged me to use my wednesdays differently. I started visiting Kampala with her hand holding me. My very first visit was magical. I received three hugs from three warm and charming ladies of the club. I was received like their own despite not knowing much about me at all.

I visited again and again until I was inducted in at the start of 2014.

Before I was inducted, I visited many other clubs with PP James Serugo of RC Kampala and my mentor PAG Flavia Serugo. I compared all those clubs to Kampala Naalya and the reception I had received on my visit to Kampala Naalya was not matched.

While RC Kampala Naalya was not (and still not) a perfect club, for me I found a sense of belonging that I had not experienced in any other social setting in my adult life then. I enjoyed coming to fellowships, attending service projects, home hospitalities, club retreats, etc. I still enjoy them to date. I have served my club in various capacities and while the responsibilities come with their own challenges, I still say very sincerely that I have enjoyed every bit of it.

# OutToLunch: Opportunity a great pathway to professional career

oung lawyers have been incessantly posting on X (formerly Twitter) about the poor pay they receive once they finish their long courses at university and the Law Development Centre. Apparently, they are being paid peanuts yet they have spent nearly five years learning.

They claimed that their employers "force" them to take loans to buy suits and cars to keep up appearances. Of course, nobody expects a lawyer in a round neck

t-shirt and ripped jeans. Until further notice, that is for tech entrepreneurs and impresarios.

Although many of the complaining tweeting counsels, as they prefer to be called these days, acknowledged to receiving regular salaries, one of their contentious issues is that once they win cases in court, the senior lawyers and partners of the law firms don't give them a percentage of the money they have won.

Some senior (read older) lawyers argued that young lawyers needed to be more concerned about their personal professional development than the money they are being paid. They should be lucky enough to have an address, a desk where they can report to experience their profession in real life and practice in the hollowed walls of judges' chambers while enjoying perks such as WIFI and spiced black tea that some law firms offer.

One day, the senior lawyers argued, their hefty pay day will come. The younglings counter argued that they don't eat experience and wifi. The spiced tea

won't pay for their fancy apartments in Najjeera and impress the members of the fairer sex. They want money. They want to earn big even when they have little or no experience.

I must admit that I have no idea how law firms operate but I have been hustling for a while. Over the years, I have realized that many young people who walk into businesses begging to be employed cease being serious about their jobs once they get employed. They get so illusioned about what they call little pay and start paying little attention. Many even leave the jobs unceremoniously only to beg for the same jobs back they were despising when they had them. Money, I learnt a long time ago, is usually little when you have it. When you don't have that money, it ceases being little.

It is unrealistic for a young person who gets employed and is assigned a project to expect to receive the same amount of pay as the partners who have been working for 30 or 40 years. Even when those partners, as young lawyers claimed, may not have done most of the work. Setting up the

#### firms enables them to do that.

Also, gross payments don't mean there are no expenses. Otherwise, where do law firms get money to pay their young lawyers a monthly salary when there are no cases being won? Where does money to pay for rent, the despised wifi, marketing, networking and other expenses come from?

Many entrepreneurs in Uganda, if you scratch beyond the surface, go through a lot to keep their business working. Many have no days off, work longer hours and under pressure to keep the businesses afloat. Many clients such as the Government of Uganda take years to settle invoices for services and goods rendered.

If you are regular reader of Uganda's newspapers, you will see several pages on a daily basis of properties being auctioned by financial institutions. Many such properties belong to entrepreneurs who invested in businesses that didn't materialize. The pressure of a person losing their home and their family being evicted from their home is enormous. It can lead to death by suicide, heart attacks or cause irreversible mental health challenges.

This doesn't mean that entrepreneurs should not remunerate their employees better. They should but there is need for young workers to be realistic of the environment in which they work.

There are more people graduating today than jobs available. Demand and supply forces still exist.

Our economy is too small to absorb all graduates. Our annual budget is just Shs70 trillion, approximately US\$18.4 billion, not even a half of what Amazon makes in a month. And businesses are being taxed to extinction.

Emerging technologies are changing the way we work. Many jobs will evolve. Work that was done by a few people may be done by one person today, who may not even be in the country where the work is being performed.

Artificial intelligence bots will, for example, write a land sales agreement that needs a few edits in seconds and a buyer may prefer not to engage the services of a lawyer for this particular work. A lawyer who appreciates how artificial intelligence works will be better though. A young one who accepts pay comes with experience will live a better life.
