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

We were the only women in a room full of older men, and initially, we were worried that that they might dismiss us as just city girls,

with little experience of real-world challenges.

However, as the discussion on governance and social accountability progressed, we found ourselves engaged in a lively exchange. When it was time to wrap up, we expected the usual polite remarks. Instead, one of the quieter men stood up and said, "Thank you, young ladies, for coming

here today and teaching us so much. After watching and listening to you, I have decided to keep my daughter in school and make sure she finishes her education.

I would like her to be like you one day." In that

moment, the notes and data we had collected seemed insignificant compared to the impact we had made. Knowing that we had inspired a community where girls are often married off early

was incredibly moving.

Reflecting on this, I realize that our influence in promoting basic education and literacy extends beyond tangible donations. While desks, books, and classrooms are crucial, our ability to inspire and shift mindsets is equally powerful. I am not sure what the little girl in Mukono admired about me, but I hope it was something positive. Perhaps she, too, dreams of becoming a woman of significance, one day.

As we commemorate the month of basic education and literacy, I would like to encourage you to reflect on how else you can use your influence to inspire and make a difference. For example, how are you engaging with school children to motivate and empower them to become better citizens and leaders with the desire to create a better society?

Our Basic Education and Literacy Interventions in Kamuli

andera School Program, was started as an initiative to support the less privileged children of farmers in Kiyunga and neighbouring villages in Kamuli, who could not afford to take them through school.

Earlier, our teams had held engagements with farmers and noticed that school going children were accompanying their parents instead of attending school. We later discovered that the high levels of poverty, insufficient land for commercial agriculture, and general lack of appreciation for education fuelled the concerning trend.

The Rotary Club of Kampala-Naalya had worked with the community under the Rotary Vijana Poa programme which mainly focussed on skilling the youth in the same community. Through the Programme, more than 20 youths were taught the art of making craft shoes and bar soap. Their products are now on the market.

Two of the Rotary Vijana Poa Trainees, were teenage mothers, who had dropped out of school during the COVID-19 pandemic. Thanks to the support from Club Members, they both returned

to school and continue to thrive with renewed energy. One of them was part of the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards RYLA, last year, a program that she credits for transforming her life.

Later, the club supported an initiative to take children to school through the Bandera School Programme which aims to break the cycle of poverty through education.

Each primary school child in the Community needs only 50,000 Shillings and direct donations like books, pens, pencils, reams of paper school bags, uniforms, and reading materials to stay in school for a term. Those in Secondary School need up to 150,000 Shillings per term.

One can also donate a goat to the program with the hope that as the goats grow and produce, each goat will be used to cater for the school needs of the child it's attached to. The Program

also encourages teachers who can to volunteer their services whenever possible to teach or learners and mentor the teachers on the ground.

We have seen a steady rise in student enrolment since the inception of the school program and plans are now

underway to expand the school facilities to accommodate the growing student population. Today, the school program has up to 203 learners. However, only 25 of these are supported financially.

You too can be part of this program by extending your support to the needy.

The Club support in Kamuli has so far:

- Empowered youth with practical skills.
- Inspired the creation of the school program.







- Directly supported the education of vulnerable individuals.
- Encouraged community-wide participation in development initiatives.

In an inspiring show of community support, the school's director has generously offered land for the community to begin making bricks. This initiative will significantly contribute to our construction efforts, reducing costs and fostering a sense of ownership among community members.

The community's involvement in brick-making not only aids in the physical construction of the school but also symbolizes the strong foundation of community support and participation that will ensure the long-term success of this program.

Our goal is clear: To empower young minds and give them the chance to pursue a better future through education. By addressing the barriers to schooling, we hope to transform not just individual lives, but entire communities.





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School digital strategy couldn't have come at a better time.

ome years ago, a photo trended on social media. A teacher with impeccable fine art skills somewhere in Africa had drawn a Microsoft Word interface on the blackboard of his classroom. He would use that image to teach the learners about computers and most importantly how to use Microsoft Word.

Microsoft Word is one of the most essential computer programs that people use to create all sorts of documents. It is also the entry point for most learners when it comes to using computers for documentation purposes. The teacher must have found it important to teacher his learners how to use it.

I don't know though whether the learners learnt anything. Learning how to use a computer is majorly practical. Without a

computer, you would be most likely wasting time. But what choices did the teacher have?

Uganda through its Ministry of Education and Sports has launched its digital agenda strategy that is expected to see improvements in teaching and learning outcomes according to newspaper reports. Thus, laptops, tablet computers, smartphones and such other devices will be allowed in schools to facilitate learning.

It is a good idea because digital skills are necessary for the 21st century. Learners must therefore be computer literate if they are to compete in this rapidly digitally changing

world. Digital skills are so essential today that employers expect every job seeker to possess at least the basic ones. Yet largely in Africa this has been missing.

There are many reasons for this. Lack of the devices such as computers, electricity to power them and even the internet these days even

though the cost per gigabyte of data has been reducing over the years in Uganda, it is still out of reach for many people and more so for rural schools. In some areas, the internet coverage may exist but not of the required speeds such as 4G and 5G to facilitate a seamless learning experience. Nothing is more frustrating than videos buffering or unable to download or upload at all.

There are 27.7 million internet subscriptions in the country resulting in an internet national penetration rate of 61 connections for every 100 Ugandans according to the Uganda Communications Commission June 2023 performance report.

In the period of more than a year since that report, the numbers must have significantly gone up.

It is therefore the right time for the ministry to launch its digital strategy though it must be careful enough not to widen the digital divide. Schools especially public ones must be facilitated with devices through grants that can enable children to learn as most parents especially in rural Uganda can't even afford a feature phone (kabiriiti) and therefore shouldn't be expected to provide digital devices to their children. Electricity to power them must be extended too.

Teachers will need to undergo training so that they are empowered to teach these lessons. Already, they are crying about being asked to possess bachelor's degrees and as many as

5,000 are leaving the profession according to media reports. They see no monetary value in going back to school to upgrade.

Already, many teachers never returned to classrooms after COVID-19. They had already moved on to other things such as petty trade, farming and boda boda riding.

Digital skills are very dynamic and new technologies emerge all the time. The teachers will have to keep up with the rapid changes so that they don't impart learners with yesterday's skills.

It is a daunting task though for the Ugandan public service. Today, in many cases, if you send an email to most people in public service, you have to call them several times to remind them that you sent an email. In some of these offices, it is not even uncommon to be

informed that there is no data to check emails. Many times, officers don't even have a working computer. I believe many public schools

don't have a working computer either.

In fact, there
is a school in
northern Uganda
where my Rotary
club has built
a lab pending
provision of such
digital devices.

Although some of the teachers have email accounts, they usually ride a boda boda a few kilometers away to a trading centre to be able to access emails. I believe many schools face similar challenges.

The new digital approach cuts out the job for the ministry of education to empower learners with the digital skills they need to take on the challenges of the 21st century.

And since the highest level of education the majority of Ugandans will ever attain is secondary education, the implementation of this new digital strategy couldn't have come at a better time.

has provided the land, and Rotary club of Nansana is spearheading the mobilization of funds for the construction and equipping of the hospital.

The overall objective of the proposed project is to enable Municipality residents, most of them low income earners and urban poor to access affordable medical services.

A LIFE OF AUTHORITY
