Rotary International President to Grace Africa Peace Concert 2025


ampala, Uganda — Rotary International President Stephanie Urchick is set to visit Uganda in January 2025 to attend the highly anticipated 4th Africa Peace Concert. The event will be held at Nsambya Gardens, Kampala, on January 10th, and aims to raise \$500,000 to support the activities of the Makerere University Rotary Peace Center and other global peace and conflict resolution initiatives.

As the first and only Rotary Peace Center in Africa, Makerere University's Peace Center has been at the forefront of peacebuilding and conflict resolution since its inauguration in February 2020. To date, it has produced 110 graduates who are working tirelessly to foster peace within their communities.

Rotarians and Rotaractors are being called upon to support this noble cause in various ways, including direct pledges, ticket purchases, and securing sponsorships.

Ways to Contribute:

- 1. Direct Pledges: Contributions can be made directly to the Makerere University Peace Centre or the Sam Owori Peace Fund via The Rotary Foundation (TRF).
- 2. Ticket Purchases: A \$100 ticket grants entry to the



concert, with \$50 allocated towards TRF contributions.

3. VIP Tables: Reserve a VIP table seating 10 for UGX 10,000,000, with 60% of the payment directed

4. Sponsorship Packages: Sponsorship opportunities range from UGX 30 million (Bronze) to \$80,000 (Key Sponsor), with a 5% commission awarded to Rotarians or Rotaractors securing sponsorships.

5. Major Donor Contributions: Individuals can become Major Donors with a contribution of \$10,000 or a \$3,333 deposit by January 7th, 2025, earning the honor of being pinned by the Rotary International President during the event.

The Africa Peace Concert will feature vibrant African music, networking opportunities, and a celebration of Rotary's commitment to peace. Funds raised will go toward scholarships and activities that promote peace and conflict resolution globally.

Attendees are also invited to a special breakfast tour at the Makerere University Rotary Peace Center to witness firsthand the impact of past fundraising efforts.

Ending the Year in an Extraordinary Way



Rotary Calls for Nominations for its Highest Service Award

ach year, the Rotary Foundation honours a select group of extraordinary Rotarians and Rotaractors with the Distinguished Service Award, the Foundation's most prestigious recognition.

With nominations now open for the 2024 cycle, Rotarians worldwide are encouraged to reflect on those among them whose tireless dedication and impactful service have helped advance the Foundation's mission of "doing good in the world."

This award isn't just about celebrating achievements—

it's about telling the story of individuals who have gone above and beyond to make a difference, not just in their districts but across borders and continents.

Recipients are the unsung heroes who have devoted years of their lives to Rotary projects, building bridges between communities, and advocating for causes such as education, healthcare, and peace.

Who Can Be Nominated?

To qualify, nominees must have received the Citation for Meritorious

Service at least four years ago and demonstrated sustained, exceptional service to The Rotary Foundation.

What makes this award unique is that financial contributions,

however substantial, are not considered. Instead, it recognizes those who have rolled up their sleeves, taken action, and inspired others through their commitment.

Nominees must meet specific eligibility criteria:

They must be active Rotarians in good standing.

They cannot hold leadership roles such as District Governor or RI Director at the time of nomination.

They must not have previously received this award.

In addition, each nomination must be endorsed by the nominee's District Governor and two other Rotarians, one of whom must come from outside the nominee's district.

Why It Matters

Past recipients of the award often describe the recognition as a humbling moment that

validates years of hard work. It's not about the pin or the crystal award they receive; it's about knowing that their efforts—whether leading global grant projects, championing polio eradication, or driving education initiatives—have left a lasting legacy.

"These individuals represent the heart and soul of Rotary," says one Foundation Trustee. "Their work is a testament to what happens when service meets passion. They inspire all of us to think bigger and do better."

How to Nominate

Rotarians and Rotaractors have until 31 January to nominate one candidate from their district using the online nomination form.

Each nominee must have demonstrated substantial service in at least three key areas, such as leading impactful Foundation programs, fostering innovation, or advocating for Rotary's mission on a global scale.

If You're Not At The Table, You're On The Menu

ou've likely heard the rule: "Never fail to show up." Those who live by this principle master the art of success.

Having visited 92 Rotaract Clubs and interacted with both leaders and members, it's clear to me that our leadership journeys often fall into two categories: "The Influencers" and "The Consumables." The question is, which one are you? Are You an Influencer in Your Club?

Ask yourself:

How much influence do I currently have in my club?

When was the last time my idea shaped the club's culture or activities?

These are the foundational questions of leadership. Joining Rotaract means embracing opportunities to grow, learn, and lead. Leadership isn't just for those in formal positions—it's about stepping up, contributing, and making an impact regardless of your title.

At the Table or On the Menu?

To shape decisions in your club, you must be present at the table where decisions are made. If you choose to stay absent, you risk having your interests overlooked or decided by others. Think of it like this: if you're not part of the discussion, you become part of the agenda—on the menu, not at the table.

Be the Lion When It Counts

I get it—you might not be the "lion" of your Rotaract Club right now, and that's okay. But when necessary, act like one. Dress in confidence, speak with purpose, and command respect. Show up as someone who contributes meaningfully.

Otherwise, you risk being seen as the zebra among lions—an easy target. The truth is, if you're not stepping up to have your voice heard, you're not fulfilling your role as a member. Do you recognize a need? Be part of the solution. The way to do that is to find your seat at the table. The Time to Act is Now

The good news? You still have six months to make your mark. The bad news? Many of us are still too comfortable being on the menu—waiting, watching, and letting others decide our fate.

Don't wait. Step up, speak out, and secure your place where it matters. After all, the table is where the real work happens—and you belong there. New WHO report reveals governments deprioritizing health spending

he 2024 Global Heath Expenditure Report by the World Health Organization (WHO) shows that the average per capita government spending on health in all country income groups fell in 2022 from 2021 after a surge in the early pandemic years.

The report entitled, "Global spending on health Emerging from the pandemic" has been published in alignment with the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) Day campaign marked annually on 12 December. The campaign's focus for 2024 is on improving financial protection for people everywhere to access health services they need.

According to WHO, Government spending on health is crucial to delivering UHC. Its deprioritization can have dire consequences in a context where 4.5 billion people worldwide lack access to basic health services and 2 billion people face financial hardship due to health costs.

"While access to health services has been improving globally, using those services is driving more and more people into financial hardship or poverty. Universal Health Coverage Day is a reminder that health for all means everyone can access the health services they need, without financial hardship,"

said Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director-General

Bride Beaten up on Honeymoon for her Beauty!

oung people who have Spotify on their mobile phones may not easily put themselves in the shoes of a late 1950s village man in Gomba county of central Uganda who would have to walk several miles to a kirabo (club) to hear recorded music playing. One of the first ever recorded songs by a Ugandan artiste was Tereza Ow'ebbina Eddene (Theresa with a big behind) by iconic "Jajja w'abayimbi" (grandpa of musicians) Christopher Ssebadduka. People would walk long distances to go where they could access a sound producing machine playing mostly English music by the likes of Jim Reeves, Beetles and some Swahili stuff like Malaika.

Tereza Ow'ebbina Eddene was reportedly inspired by the beauty of an indefatigable health worker Theresa Nansikombi who passed on last week at 92 but in the late fifties was in her twenties. and worked in different districts of Uganda promoting especially maternal health. Several attributes that made her attractive included her then rare light complexation for a Ugandan African - being of mixed Irish and Ganda parentage; her kindness and devotion to social work and the meticulous smartness around her. But for budding music composer Christopher Sebadduka, the most important things about Tereza was her bigger than average behind, firm breasts and motherly eyes.

Since Theresa Nansikombi's passing, social media has come up with several other Theresa's of her generation as the ones who inspired the then young Ssebadduka's fertile imagination. They include an also departed Munyarwanda beauty in Buddu (Greater Masaka) who also fitted Ssebadduka's description of the woman for whom he was ready to spear any intending competitor (alikwata ku Tereeza ndimukuba effumu!)

My own Theresa was not only a qualified claimant with the same attributes, but this paternal aunt of mine, Senga Tereeza Nanfuka, also paid a heavy price for it. My last visit to her in Kabulassoke – Gomba just after the Covid-19 lockdown, was a memorable one that I will take with me to my grave. Seeing that I

was now an old man whom she could trust with her harrowing secret memory, she called me to sit on her sick bed and in our last conversation in this earthly life, proceeded to tell me her horrendous experience depicting the injustices African women of her generation used to endure at the time, that some even undergo today.

Senga Tereeza was married off in her early teens to a man who like her, never traveled beyond their native county of Gomba. The biggest 'towns' they ever visited were Bukandula and Kabulassoke. Her prosperous suitor -he owned a bicycle – rode her to her new home in Maddu village where they started their two weeks' honeymoon that meant her being confined to the bedroom to ensure she conceives, while for him he could go around visiting friends to be congratulated for getting a bride. That was the time when Christopher Ssebadduka released his hit Tereza Ow'ebbina Eddene.

My 'uncle-in-law' one day on leaving his bride in the 'honeymoon' confinement rode to a kirabo in Kabulassoke to enjoy the modern life. He found the gramophone playing *Tereza Ow'ebbina Eddene* and couldn't believe his ears. "Anko, anko!" the revelers

yelled, meaning "encore", and the DJ obliged. (DJs those days didn't click some digital numbers but would spin real, breakable discs, the commonest label then being 'Kagabe'. Musicians those days had to travel to Nairobi to be recorded, and it was not about paying studio production fees – the song had to first be peer reviewed, perfected, and with the singer required to play at least one instrument.

Tereeza was played again and the man's fears were 'confirmed'. Sebadduka was describing his very own bride so accurately that the musician "must" have known her intimately, my villager uncle concluded. The big behind, sweet voice, breasts as hard as a tennis ball (he must have handled these while attending to mzungu priests playing 'tena' at Bukalagi Parish, but what did he expect of a 14-year-old's breasts?)

Without wasting any more time, he jumped onto his bicycle and rode like a *musezi* (night dancer) was chasing him. Reaching home he just let the bicycle fall in the compound, burst into the house, kicked the bedroom door open and proceeded to give my innocent aunt the beating of her life. When his hands and feet started getting tired from boxing and kicking the poor teenage bride who had also run out breath to cry any more, he started the interrogation.

"How long have you been dating Ssebadduka? Where did he meet you? Why didn't you tell about him? Are you still seeing him? Will your parents return the *mutwalo* (bride price I paid for you?" and so on. Aunt Tereeza had not yet even ever heard of Christopher

Sebadduka, But her denials only triggered more beatings further inflamed by the inferiority complex of my uncle-in-law who was scared of competing with a music star. So she finally "confessed" to the non-existent affair with the music star. To have peace and be spared further beatings, she promised to completely ditch Ssebadduka and love only her new husband. And she lived in peaceful fear ever after.

obviously never knew my aunt and the other young women whom he might have unknowingly caused such pain. But he too was punished by the Catholic church which chastised and almost excommunicated him for claiming in the song that Tereeza had the best you-knowwhat in the Catholic Cathedral (ne mu Kelezia enkulu, gw'obakira!).

May the souls of trailblazing Ugandan musician Christopher Ssebadduka and peasant housewife Theresa Nanfuka Rest In Eternal Peace!

He wanted to find a locker for one of the consumables that he can't do away with. Many of the revelers that would pay highly for his food and drinks were also nipping away something. He wanted to lock it so he reduces the cost of replenishment.

Only that it wasn't. On many WhatsApp groups, traders narrated similar experiences. Somebody said she had lost 36 rolls of curtains in a similar manner. Another mentioned sports equipment. Somebody else said cosmetics. Another said shoes, bags and children's clothes.

Factory owners do the same. Police officers have been arrested before for stealing stolen goods (exhibits) in their custody.

The good news was that the bank managed to detect them before money was circulated to hundreds of customers.

If you notice at butchers, some people buy many kilos of meat but pack into smaller amounts of 500 grams each or less. One of the greatest minds in fishing, Peter contemplated, and received inspiration. He thought well to say "May these words of my mouth and this


meditation of my heart be pleasing." This reveals that a contemplative lifestyle can be an act of worship and progression.









