
 ↑ here are things in the last of life one can take for granted especially if you find them working well. When growing up, there was well organised administrative system in my village and in the subcounty (Gombolola).

This system was managed by chiefs and staff, none of them had a degree qualification. For water, sanitation and hygiene, the one in-charge (an Assistant Health Inspector) was a certificate holder from Mbale School of Hygiene. He was popularly known as nowo aila (the hygienic one),

not by his name,

Sabali.

This gentleman exhibited hygiene in action. For example, he always wore brilliant white garments and rode on a sparkling clean white bicycle. Everything of him bore hygiene including his home. He was a moving



example.

He taught communities hygiene, and enforced it. Households that didn't practice what was taught, their head of the households were apprehended. No head of household wanted to be apprehended

for hygiene related offences and appear before the sub-county chief. If this happened, one's unworthiness of the headship diminishes

before the community. As a result, the benefits of adhering to hygienic practices in the communities were glaring. Hygiene relatedly diseases were rare.

In this month of March, the works of this great gentleman on sanitation freshly come to my mind. It is against this that I share with you about appreciating what having safe water and better sanitation translates into in human life. From the start, water and sanitation are essential for life and health. They, too, are essential for human dignity, empowerment and prosperity. Water and sanitation are human rights; fundamental to every person, young or old. With these basic facts at hand, there must be deliberate efforts to ensure that unequal access to safe drinking water and poor sanitation and hygiene are addressed. Thousands are falling sick or at risk of dying because of unsafe water and poor sanitation and hygiene.

Reflect on these, in Uganda, diarrhoea is reported as one of the



major childhood killer diseases, killing 33 children every day. The cause, in most cases, is children drinking unsafe water or coming into contact with contaminated hands of theirs or parents or caregivers that have not been washed with soap. Also noted is that early childhood diarrhoea contributes to high levels of stunting. This in turn affects children's cognitive development

and performance at school. In schools, lack of proper sanitation facilities also causes high absenteeism and dropouts, especially for girls.

The problem of diarrhoea is an acute one in Africa as highlighted by the African Development Bank Water Sector

Activities and Initiatives Report of 2019. The report reveals that in 2017, about 59 million children in Africa were stunted. And about 14 million children suffered from wasting, an indication of acute malnutrition. Around 50% of the cases were associated with inadequate water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH). Imagine!

The poor people carry the greatest burden of poor sanitation.

The poorest 20 percent of the population is 13.5 times more likely to defecate in the open than the wealthiest 20 percent. One of the keys to reducing childhood illness and death is to stop using open fields or the bush as toilets. This open defecating is about 1% in Kampala city. In Uganda, nearly a tenth of the population practices open defecation, and two thirds of households do not wash with soap.

Rotarians, the call to us this month is to move into action more than before in increasing access to safe water and better sanitation. We need to step higher in addressing hygienic behaviour- more focus is needed in this area. What is consider basic like hand washing with soap after

defecating and before eating or preparing food need attention.

Our magic of service ought to be seen in WASH. Let us exhibit trends of Assistant Health Inspector. May you save someone's life today by doing something in WASH.



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overnor Anne Nkutu of D9213 has urged Rotarians from Districts 9213 and 9214 not to let artificial boundaries create divisions among them. She made this statement during a courtesy visit to the Rotary Club of Mengo, a club she once served as an Assistant Governor in 2017, but which now falls under District 9214.

Anne's visit was a gesture of camaraderie and connection, reinforcing the spirit of unity within the different Rotary districts.

Draped in a traditional gomesi, Anne observed that while Rotary districts in the United States typically have around 1,500 Rotarians each, Uganda boasts over 5,000 in a single district. Given this growth, she noted that structural realignments, including the creation of more districts, are inevitable.

"In a few years, do not be surprised if RC Mengo finds itself in the same district as RC Kampala Naalya. It is only a matter of time, and in the meantime, we must not allow artificial boundaries to take root, we are one people," Anne stated emphatically.

Earlier, PAG Ivan Kalanzi had introduced Anne as an International Guest, a label she subtly challenged.

Accompanied by her Personal Assistant, Sylvia Nankya, Anne revealed that District 9213 is currently home to 130 clubs, of which she has already visited 125. With just five remaining,



she is set to charter ten new clubs before the end of her term.

Reflecting on the future, Anne remarked, "DGE Geoffrey Kitakule will need to visit all 140 clubs, which is no small task for any Governor."



Speaking on the advancement of women in Rotary, Anne highlighted that only 25% of the 1.2 million Rotarians worldwide are female. In Africa, women make up 37% of the membership, and in District 9213, 44% of Rotary volunteers are women.

Anne shared her experience from the District Governors

Training in Orlando, USA, where only 100 of the 540 governors were women, a figure she deemed low.

She estimated that achieving gender parity could take up to another 25 years from now and stressed the need to accelerate these actions.

The Governor urged clubs to ramp up their efforts in attracting women and empowering them with leadership roles, especially considering that only two women have served as Rotary International

Presidents in the organization's 125 year history.

This year, RC Mengo celebrated 37 years of service, and the club's Charter Secretary, Peter ljemba Kaggwa, was present at today's meeting. So was Past President Ssimbwa Bunya, who served as President in

2006 when the club proudly welcomed its first female member. PP Ssimbwa received a warm round of applause from everyone, including District TRF Chair Kate Barasa, Early Bird's Magical President Frank Neil, Nansana's **President Elect** Fred Mukasa, and Philip Katamba,

who was present at the pinning ceremony of the club's first female member.

Mengo's Magical President, Pafra Mulambuzi, gave a shout out to all the women in the club for their amazing contributions, saying they are out here

"moving mountains." The President mentioned that 32% of his club members are female.

During the Q&A session, PDG Mike Sebalu threw a question at Governor Anne, asking whether the notion that women are their own worst enemies holds any truth. In response, Anne dismissed it as a stereotype. "We are human beings, and like everyone else, we have our flaws, but I strongly disagree that we are our own problem," she said.

Minutes after Mike's question, Rtn Ignitious Higiro had the crowd in stitches when he reported to the Governor that, over the years, he has sponsored three women to join his club. However, he couldn't help but wonder why none of them has bothered to bring another woman into the fold.

# High temperatures and what districts could learn from Buganda

ampala used to be known as the city of seven hills but that was long ago.

As the city expanded, so were the hills. If you get a chance to stand at the top of some of these hills, you will see many more hills in now what is considered

of tourism revenue for enterprising business people. All they need is a good high-rise structure on which telescopes could be mounted for people to see what Kampala has got to offer.

The problem though is that some of these hills may end up embarrassing us. Take the example of a hill that you face when driving from Masaka to Kampala. Around Maya, you will face

the Nsangi hill, full of houses that explain our lack of proper planning. One house faces this side, another faces the other side. One is multifloors and another is the size of a poor man's single room hut. But they all have one thing in common— a lack of trees.

At least the original seven hills that formed Kampala

have lots of trees. The 'new' ones? Something needs to be done. They were all originally well treed. Then land entrepreneurs showed up with graders. Cut down the trees and subdivided the hills into plots measuring

50x100 feet in size or less. They heavily advertised them as "organised" housing estates.

Kampala's middle class rushed to acquire them and started competing on who puts up the ugliest structure. Some built houses almost the size of the entire plot leaving absolutely no space to plant a tree or even some grass. The hills have ended up of what one once called a concrete jungle!

Outside Kampala, forests were cut down for timber and charcoal and we didn't think much of replacing the trees. Certainly, we had never heard of sustainable logging.





Deplete everything and blame some faceless mafia. The trick works on the masses.

That perhaps explains the high temperatures we are experiencing in Kampala and across the country today. If you drive through the countryside where the significant majority of the population depends on rainfed agriculture, a hunger crisis looms even though this is expected to be the dry season.

Although harsh weather events or even changes in the climate that affect Ugandans can't be entirely blamable on Ugandans, there is much that we can do ourselves. One of the easiest things to do is planting trees, many of which wouldn't require much effort to grow. Perhaps the tree should be one that offers benefits to people regularly such as fruit trees from which income could be derived.

The people at the helm of Buganda Kingdom understood this and initiated a tree planting plan at every betrothment (kwanjula) and last funeral rites ceremonies and this could further be escalated by the district local governments. At least in urban areas, everyone who builds a house is supposed to have an approved architectural plan. Urban planners should ensure that each plan presented for approval has trees as part of it. And before occupation permits are issued, there must be trees already planted.

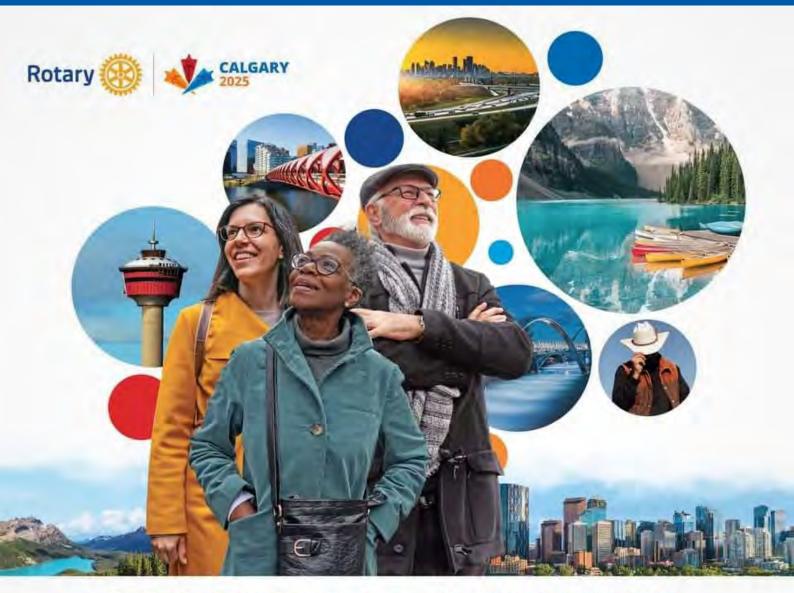
When urban authorities visit rental properties to determine and/or collect property service tax, they should check whether the trees exist and if not, a penalty could be administered. The Uganda Revenue Authority could do the same when collecting rental income tax.

Where commercial building in the city can't have trees, they can commit to maintaining trees on the streets on which they are located or a nearby public park. Failure to do so, they would receive a penalty.

Real estate dealers who subdivide land into the socalled organised housing estates would be required to plant trees along the main roads within that estate as part of their license and this could be done well before the land is sold. No trees planted; no land titles issued. The land registry would have to work with the district local governments on this. Those who buy the land would be required not to temper with the trees. They can only maintain them. Enforceable penalties for those who fail to adhere to this.

Of course, for this to work, the districts and urban authorities would have to be intentional with supervision to ensure compliance. It should not be too difficult to enforce.

#### DISCIPLINE FROM HOME

Many families are facing the challenge of disciplining right from home, thinking school will take up the role.

The word for train up is chanak which means to initiate, dedicate and to discipline. It's

important to INITIATE meaning to come up with, DEDICATE which is phrased for commitment and DISCIPLINE which is a deliberate effort to guide or direct in the right way.

Let us lay emphasis on discipline as part of training up a child. Child psychologists carried out a study and discovered that the first five to seven years of a child's life are crucial for shaping their obedience and responsiveness to instruction.

This is the stage where children learn how to receive and obey

commands. If a child does not learn obedience in these formative years, it becomes increasingly difficult to correct their behavior later.

I once observed a parent calling their threeyear-old child multiple times, but the child

ignored them. Instead of addressing the disobedience, the parent

chased after them, turning it into a game.

No, your child must be taught to obey your voice. When you say 'come', the child should be trained to respond. When you tell them not to do something, they must know you mean it.


If the situation calls for the rod of correction, use it wisely. A parent must discipline with a clear mind, not out of blind anger.

Some children who were never disciplined became menaces to their parents in adulthood, insulting and even beating them up. This should never happen u Der your watch as a parent.


Take Home: As a parent, it is your divine duty to discipline your children. Teach them to listen to you, honour the voice of God and to respect anybody older than them, including an older sibling.
