# Ready to Lead? District D9213 Seeks Governor Nominee Designate

ominations for the position of District Governor Nominee Designate (DGND) for the Rotary District 9213 are open. The selected candidate will assume the role of District Governor in the 2027/28 Rotary Year, succeeding Gerald Obai.

In a communication addressed to club presidents and secretaries, District Governor Anne Nkutu outlined the nomination process, emphasizing the importance of selecting the most qualified candidate. According to Rotary International

The successful nominee will be officially announced during the District Conference, set to take place in Jinja from April 9 to 13."

Bylaws (Article 12.030.3),

nominations must be submitted through a club resolution, certified by the club secretary. Each club may nominate only one of its own members.

DG Nkutu also reminded clubs that campaigning or canvassing in any form is strictly prohibited, in line with Article 13.010 of the Rotary International Bylaws.

To qualify, candidates must:

- Be a member in good standing of a functioning Rotary club within the district.
- district.Have served as a club president for a

full term or as a charter president for at least six months.

- Demonstrate commitment and ability to fulfill the duties of a district governor.
- Possess knowledge of the role and responsibilities as outlined in the

Manual of Procedure.



 Submit a signed statement confirming their qualifications and willingness to serve.

Interested candidates must submit a completed Governor - Nominee Designate Form, a club resolution, and a comprehensive CV. Applications should be sent to the District Governor at anne.t.nkutu@gmail.com no later than April 3, 2025.



n the beginning of creation there was environment and human beings. They coexisted in harmony. Today, the con-existence is in turbulence. What has changed in the coexistence equation?

This month of April, with the theme- **Environment**, the answers are being beckoned from us all for addressing this equation. Has the nucleus of co-

existence given way? What next? What seems to be pausing is; what to be done, how to be done, when to be done, and who to do. What is agreeable is that somethings need to be done, and done

now.

It is estimated that 91% of all plastic waste that has ever been made is not recycled, making it only one of the biggest environmental problems."

To give us the appreciation of how the world is grappling with a host of pressing environmental challenges, we shall take



to highlight these challenges and their depth.

The bottom line is a need for immediate attention and actions in the mitigation and adaption. Today, environmental challenges are manifesting with disasters, losses and pollution, affecting climate patterns

biodiversity and living. Records and several studies have given different dimensions

and aspects of what is happening today to the environment. Here are the first highlights.

Global warming from fossil fuels has resulted into 2024 being confirmed as the hottest year in history. It recorded global average temperatures of 1.60C above pre-industrial levels. And, also, the first calendar year to reach more than 1.5C above the pre-industrial level. This has come with several climate effects. Among them heat waves, floods and hurricanes that have become more intense and frequent.

Fossil fuel dependence has contributed to the global warming from the emission of greenhouse gases. This has brought challenges of transition to a less carbon technologies. It calls for ways for stimulating innovations in low-carbon technologies.

Food, though being a basic need, its waste bears an environmental challenge. A third of the food intended for human consumption, about around 1.3 billion tons is reported wasted or lost.



account for about onequarter of greenhouse gas emissions annually. For developing countries, 40% of food waste occurs at the

post-harvest and processing level, while in developed countries, 40% of food waste occurs at the retail and consumer levels.

Biodiversity loss is a big concern. lts natural rate of replenishment is lower than human demands. In the past 50 years, a rapid growth of

human consumption, population growth, global trade and urbanization has had impact on biodiversity. Humanity is using more

than it can replenish naturally. The demand gap is increasingly widening resulting into environment challenge.

- 2 delegates Clubs with 26 to 50 members
- 3 delegates Clubs with 51 to 75 members
- 4 delegates Clubs with 76 to 100 members
- 5 delegates Clubs with 101 to 125 members
- 6 delegates Clubs with 126 to 150 members
- 7 delegates Clubs with 151 to 175 members

#### Requirements for Delegate Submission

Each club's delegate credentials (Name, Email,

Telephone, RI Number) must be submitted on clubheaded paper, duly signed by both the Club President and Secretary.

Why Do We "Ruffle Feathers" to Annoy?

n today's issue, Annoy someone lately and "ruffle their feathers"? This playful phrase has a surprisingly rich history. Curious why it's still fluttering around today?

Picture this: you're at a party, and someone makes a comment that just doesn't sit right. Suddenly, you feel like a ruffled bird, feathers all askew. That's what it means to "ruffle someone's feathers" - to annoy or upset them, often by disturbing their peace or challenging their views.

The phrase "ruffle someone's feathers" is as old as the hills, or at least as old as the 19th century.

Over the years, the phrase has maintained its core meaning, though its usage has spread beyond the literal. In literature and everyday conversation, it's been used to describe everything from minor annoyances to major disputes. In the 20th century, it found its way into political discourse, often used to describe the effect of controversial policies or statements.

has stood the test of time.

Today, "ruffle someone's feathers" is a staple in our linguistic toolkit, used to describe anything from a sibling's teasing to a boss's

unexpected critique. It's a phrase that captures the essence of human interaction - how easily we can unsettle each other, sometimes without even trying. And while it might not have the same ring as "rock the boat" or "stir the pot," it carries a certain charm, evoking the image of a flustered bird.

So next time you find yourself in a heated debate or a playful argument, remember: a little feather-ruffling can be a good thing. It keeps conversations lively and reminds us that a bit of irritation now and then is just part of the human experience. After all, what's life without a few ruffled feathers to keep things interesting?

open field. It is some kind of event. The person on the microphone is ecstatic. The crowd is roaring with joy. They have probably seen this girl before do some performance. Whoever is shooting the video only focuses on the

teenager. It is not clear where the video was taken but somewhere in Africa. Somebody said it was South Sudan.

When she reaches the middle of the field, she confidently picks up one of the deadliest weapons


ever made — the AK47 gun. She points it in the air as if she is going to shoot but she doesn't. She instead starts to disassemble it. The crowd roars at every part removed. Within no time,

she re-assembles the AK47 gun. The crowd has never cheered like this before. Her mission is done. Puts the gun down and walks away. The video ends there.

I would have wanted to watch more to get the context of the entire event and what drives an

entire country to gather to watch teenage school girls disassemble and reassemble automatic assault rifles. Is it about defending their country which in most cases means keeping politicians in power? Is it self-defense? Or building a significant base of future innovators that can

go make better guns than the AK47?
Unfortunately, it was hard to get answers to such questions from the video clip. But it keeps one thinking about the education policy of some of these African countries. Previously, African leaders had such courses branded patriotism and empowering the masses to defend themselves. The gun, particularly the Ak47,



people and there was a need to demystify it, the African leaders argued. They enrolled thousands of post-primary students in such courses. The countries remain largely poor decades later.

I am not so sure how long it takes to teach a kid how to learn the intricacies of assembling an AK47. It must be some good training and some good resources. Military trainers, securing a suitable venue, guns, bullets, and all that. And then much more money to organize the "graduation" event where the learners showcase their impeccable skills with the AK47 and perhaps other types of guns.

The majority of these AK47 graduates will most likely not finish their formal education like is the case in Africa. Very few kids who enroll into primary make it to university or other tertiary institutions. Many actually don't complete their secondary education. And looking at that girl in the video, perhaps the only

those to do with the AK47. What is she going to do with such skills? Unless she joins the military, she may end up in a militia that seeks to topple those who trained her or into some law breaker of repute.

There are many 21<sup>st</sup> century skills that young girls need to acquire ahead of learning how to shoot a gun. Digital skills are crucial to make young people competitive and if they can learn to assemble a gun, they can learn to code too. They are more likely to earn better coding than shooting guns. They are more likely to contribute to the development of their countries with digital skills than impeccable gun skills.

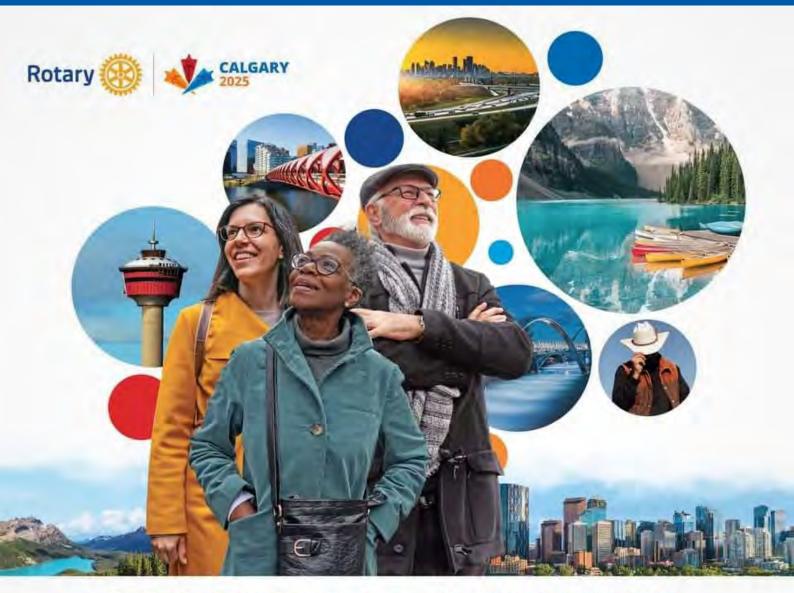
That doesn't mean that there is no need to secure a country but that should be left to those who are recruited into the armed forces. The majority of people don't need military education. They need skills that can land them jobs to feed their families, pay taxes to run the country

potential.

The politicians need to think beyond themselves. Look at South Sudan where the video is said to have been made. Two old men can't control their egos so they decide to fight each other instead of using their massive natural resource endowments to create a prosperous country.

Countries don't develop because the masses can shoot a gun. They do when the masses have skills necessary that make them competitive in the world. Imagine if that girl instead of an AK47, she was displaying coding skills?
