istrict Governor Anne Nkutu has praised the Rotary Club of Kampala Ssese Islands for setting a high standard in sustainable community development through their transformative work in education and health.

Speaking at the commissioning of a new girls' dormitory at Bweza Ddagye Rotary Community School on Saturday, April 26, 2025, DG Anne commended the club's unwavering commitment to uplifting the Ssese Islands, calling their contributions a shining example of Rotary

service at its best.

She added that the approach by the club fits within her call to consolidate projects that had been initiated in previous years.

Construction of the newly commissioned dormitory, valued at UGX 140 million, began during the Hope Creator Rotary year under then-President Irene Nabayunga and was completed under the stewardship of Magical President Moses Ssebugwawo.

Support for the project came from the China Road and Bridge Corporation (CRBC), a subsidiary of China Communications Construction Company known for its global infrastructure projects. Besides co-funding the construction, CRBC donated

to construct a perimeter fence to further enhance the safety of learners and staff.

The Club also donated more than 80 dozens of books and soccer balls to the learners during the same event.

This latest achievement adds to the club's significant contributions at Bweza Ddagye Rotary Community

School, which include a classroom block, an administrative block, teachers' quarters, and now the girls' dormitory.

Club President Moses Ssebugwawo is optimistic that the new dormitory will provides safe and decent accommodation for the school's female learners, many of whom previously faced long and risky journeys to attend school. Currently, the school serves

278 learners from Nursery to Primary Four.

The Headmistress, speaking at the event, expressed heartfelt gratitude to the Rotary Club and called for further support — particularly a boys' dormitory, a kitchen, and more staff quarters — to meet the growing needs of the school.

The event, which began with a dedication mass, was graced by Rotarians, community leaders, project partners, and

guests from within and outside Kalangala. Special recognition was given to Works Minister Gen. Edward Katumba Wamala, a club member, for his pivotal support toward the success of the project.

Area leaders applauded the Rotary Club of Kampala Ssese Islands for setting a shining example of sustainable service and creating a lasting legacy of hope and opportunity for future generations.

Earlier efforts by the club include the construction of a health center, now managed by the central government and serving the broader Kalangala community.

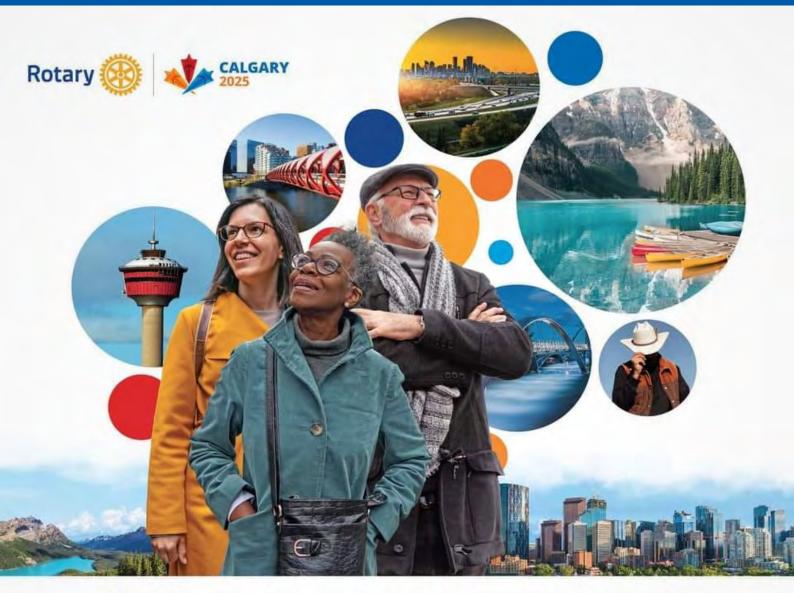

Fun Facts

Why is it Called "Giving Someone the Cold Shoulder"?

hen a guest overstayed their welcome, a host might serve them a cold piece of meat—often the shoulder of a roasted animal—to hint it was time to leave. Over time, this tradition grew into the phrase "giving someone the cold shoulder." Today, it means ignoring or shunning someone in a subtle way.

We know the phrase's origin lies in old customs, but what makes English so fascinating is how such odd acts become vivid turns of speech.

There's a timeless charm in these old words and phrases, each with its own life story. They link us to voices of the past and remind us that language changes as our world does.

Think of all the strange, funny sayings we use without even blinking. "Bite the bullet" has no bullets at dinner. "Break a leg" should never mean harm. Yet we say them because they paint pictures in our minds. They make small talk more fun and our stories richer. To learn these phrases is to open secret doors. You step into a hall of mirrors, where words bend and shift.


When we say "giving someone the cold shoulder," we might imagine a frosty scene. Perhaps the person in question sits at the edge of a banquet table, feeling unwelcome and out of place. Or picture a lively room that goes silent as one guest enters. No one looks up; no one offers a warm smile. The feeling is chilly, and the language matches that mood.

This old phrase also shows how English evolves. The words stay the same, yet times change. We no longer serve cold cuts as hints. Instead, we turn away, check our phones, or pretend we don't see the person. But the phrase endures because it still works as a vivid image. The language keeps it alive.

If you find these language twists intriguing, you might dig deeper into the vast garden of English expressions. Every idiom has roots buried in culture and history. Some grew from jokes or old customs. Others came from sailors, farmers, or traveling merchants. Each word we use has been shaped by real lives and events, often long forgotten.

In the end, "giving someone the cold shoulder" stands as one tiny jewel in the grand collection of English sayings. It's a phrase that hints, shows, and whispers from a distant past—still cool to the touch, still part of our shared tongue today.

 ↑ he death of Pope Francis came a little bit as a surprise. He had been seen publicly on Easter Sunday, another surprise, blessing the faithful from the balcony that overlooks St Peter's Square. Even though he was visibly weak, it seemed he was on the road to recovery after spending more than a month in hospital being treated of double pneumonia. He was 88 years old.

Pope Francis is the third pope to die in the last 20 years following John Paul II in April 2005 and Benedict XVI in December 2022 even though he (Benedict) had long resigned from this position due to ill health. That decision of Benedict to resign allowed Francis to assume office in March 2013.

Less than two years after his election, Pope Francis made the long trip to Uganda, becoming the third pope to do so largely thanks to the Uganda martyrs. And like most of the papal visits especially to countries like ours, everything comes to a standstill. Roads are paved, buildings are rehabilitated and grass is planted, public holidays granted and that wasn't any different in 2015. People traveled from far and near to attend the mass that he


led.

Those who met the Pope either in Uganda, the Vatican or elsewhere all talk about his humility. As he departed Uganda, a photo is shared of him climbing the steps to his Shephard One aircraft at Entebbe International Airport. He was walking alone, one hand sometimes holding his papal soutane, and another carrying a black bag, perhaps

with personal belongings. He could have had as many aides as he wished. He was the leader of more than a billion Catholics but he lived simply and perhaps sending a message to nobodies that they too can be humble. preferring a simple black Kia hatchback. Again, in a country where every public official craves for the most powerful vehicles. He lived simply and probably wanted us to learn something. Servant leadership. Showing off was not his way of life.

He also understood that the Catholic Church needed reforms in a world that is rapidly changing. It may not have made him a lot of friends within the conservatives but leadership is about making key decisions including those that are unpopular. That way he endeared many to the church.

He wanted a world where peace existed. He prayed for peace and welcomed everyone including many that he probably didn't agree with. Perhaps if they listened to him, the world would have been different.

There would be less destruction. We can all live together.

He kissed the feet of warrying parties and urged them to embrace peace. Those whose feet he kissed only shook hands for a day and some are at each other's throats again. He must have died wondering what needed to be done to stop the wars and killings that go on unabated sometimes fighting for no particular reasons apart from the egos of leaders and wealth that they would still leave on earth.

Pope Francis still sent a message to those who deprive wealth of others by stating in his will his desire for a simple burial without the ornaments and all stuff that his position could afford. If he didn't enjoy a luxurious lifestyle when alive, it would mean nothing to his body.

There is a lot that we can learn from Pope Francis. His humility, ability to embrace everyone and putting others first even when it came at a personal cost. He didn't adhere to the advice of his doctors for complete rest. He kept on meeting people and drove through the crowd in his papal mobile on Easter Sunday.

And if leaders can take his example, the world would be a better place. Peaceful and resources shared with everyone.
