More than 60 Rotarians Certified as Mediators

n a world where conflict is inevitable but not irreconcilable, Rotary District 9213 has taken a bold step to empower its members with professional conflict resolution skills, training 68 Rotarians as certified mediators in a groundbreaking initiative aimed at fostering peace within the Rotary community and beyond.

The newly certified mediators completed a rigorous Mediation Training Programme, designed to equip them with the skills to handle disputes with empathy, neutrality, and procedural fairness.

The training combined online sessions, physical workshops, and practical assignments, running from 6th to 25th May 2025, and was anchored by a highly experienced team of legal minds including Rtn.

Francis Gimara, Dr. Henry Onoria, and Justice Geoffrey Kiryabwire.

The mediation training was implemented in partnership with the ALP Dispute Settlement Hub, a leader in professional dispute resolution.

The course covered core units such as:

- Principles and Ethics of Mediation
- Conflict Analysis and Resolution Strategies
- Communication and Negotiation Skills
- Managing Emotions in Disputes
- Mediator Neutrality and Confidentiality
- Mediation Practice and Roleplay

Participants were immersed in real-life scenarios, simulations, and case reviews, preparing them to serve as neutral third parties in resolving disputes especially those arising within clubs and among Rotarians in District 9213.

The cohort began with close to 200 participants, but only 68 successfully completed all requirements to graduate. Among the newly certified mediators are Rtn. Sylvia Nankya and Rtn. Godfrey Okello-Omoding from the Rotary Club of Kampala-Naalya, who now join a vetted

pool of peacebuilders to be called upon to mediate internal Rotary disagreements when the need arises.

The graduation ceremony, held on Tuesday, 27th May 2025, at Kampala Club was presided over by District Governor Anne Nkutu. In her remarks, DG Anne commended the Governance and Ethics Committee for exceeding expectations.

"This initiative is not only equipping individuals with a lifelong skill," she said, "but also advancing our district's commitment to peacebuilding and effective conflict management. It is a shining example of Rotary serving beyond self."

She added that as Rotary continues to promote peace and conflict prevention as one of its seven areas of focus, this investment in people-centered mediation skills signals a long-term commitment to building stronger, more resilient clubs and ultimately, communities.

The mediators will now be available to support clubs across the district, ensuring disputes are resolved in a structured, confidential, and non-adversarial manner preserving Rotary's harmony, fellowship, and effectiveness.


Well, as it is appreciative to support the growth of the youth, this must come with instilling sense of responsibility. There must be a balance of assets and liabilities, as accountants

> would put it. Behaviours of heaping liabilities crushes, even to companies that ought to have been profitable. Similarly, nations with high dependent ratios, particularly of the youth, hang in poverty. This, too, can be narrowed down to the family level. Families with economic and financial stress tend to be more of those with high dependent

does the solution lie? The solution is on igniting ways of making supportive youth.

No genuine joy prevails in situations where the youth are not supportive. Recently, there was a list circulating of Rotaractor Clubs which












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failed to pay their dues and are to be terminated. From certain circles, there were messages being dispense of mother Rotary Clubs to "rescue". What joy can this bring to the mother clubs? A mother rotary club rescuing such an "unsupportive youth" is very dangerous. Put in human terms, parents paying rent of their grown-up youth. What does this signalize?

History has proved that there is value in instilling values of responsibility. Those elders whose legacies have lived for centuries spent time instilling values. And values are better instilled at youth stage. Do not expect a supportive youth without investing on values. This cuts across nations and families, and equally in Clubs. Whatever you do and you lack certain values, integrity and honesty become the missing leaks. These kinds of values cannot be magically generated. They must be instilled, better at youth stage.

Rotarians, let us end this month with a mission to establish supportive youth of today not of tomorrow. The magic is now. Tomorrow only gives the reflection of today.

President Owekmeno's Bold Vision for 2025/26

n a colorful handover ceremony held on May 27 at Ndere Cultural Centre, **Rotarian Charles** Owekmeno officially assumed office as the 14th President of the Rotary Club of Kampala-Naalya, taking over from outgoing President Sylvia Jagwe Owachi.

The event marked the beginning of a new chapter filled with ambition, energy, and a deep commitment to impactful community service.

A Personal and Historic Milestone

For President Owekmeno, the significance of the moment was not just about ascending to leadership, it was also deeply personal.

"There's something special about the number 14," he

noted, reflecting on both his position as the 14th president of the club and his milestone 40th birthday this year. The alignment, he said, symbolized a season of purpose and transformation.

Expressing gratitude to his fellow Rotarians, he lauded the legacy of leadership left by the club's past presidents, singling out Charter President Dr. Francis Lakor for setting a firm foundation.

"You will visit many Rotary clubs, but you wouldn't find one where all the past presidents are as extraordinary and simply amazing as those of our club," he said with pride.

Owekmeno also paid tribute to the District Governor, Anne Nkutu, whom he described as an exemplary

leader.

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"I told her I want to end my presidency the way she is ending hers with a smile," he remarked, highlighting her positive influence on the club and the district.

He further acknowledged his incoming board, whose dedication and unity, he believes, will be central to achieving this year's goals.

"I am honored that you've agreed to serve with me.

This year, we're going to be united in making the difference our communities desire."

A Year of Discovery, Ambition, and Action

Describing the club's 14th year as symbolic of adolescence, a time of growth, exploration, and bold experimentation, President Owekmeno challenged members to embrace innovation and go big.

"Let's express ourselves as adolescents. Let's explore new territories. But most importantly, let's do big things," he said.

Chief among them is a reimagining of the club's annual Women in Rotary event. Traditionally held as a Red Carpet Dinner event, the 2026 edition will take the shape of a high-energy Women in Rotary Concert, scheduled for March 7. The event, which will double as a fundraising platform, is being organized in partnership with Sauti Media, the team behind the acclaimed Icon Awards.

Proceeds from the concert will go toward constructing a new classroom block at New Hope Primary School in Kamuli District, where children currently study in unsafe and muddy structures.

"This is unacceptable in our generation," President Owekmeno emphasized. "We must do something meaningful for these children."

This Rotary year will also see the club deepening its collaboration with sister clubs under the theme "Unite for Good." With the Rotary Club of Kampala, Kampala - Naalya will support a transformative project at the Masaka School of the Deaf. Meanwhile, a partnership with the Rotary Club of Kampala Central will yield the first-ever Rotary Green Festival in Uganda, championing environmental sustainability and climate action.

On October 10, World Mental Health Day, the club plans to launch a long-anticipated Mental Health Project in the Acholi Quarters community.

The initiative aims to raise awareness and provide support for mental well-being, an area that continues to receive limited attention in many

underserved communities.

At the core of President Owekmeno's message was a heartfelt appeal to fellow Rotarians to

reconnect with their original passion for service.

"I hope that my presidency brings back two things: the smile you had the day you joined Rotary, and the passion you felt for serving your community," he said.

With clear plans, strong partnerships, and an inspired team, President Charles Owekmeno is setting the Rotary Club of Kampala-Naalya on a path of high impact and visibility.

"Ambition is what drives us to go to the next level," he concluded. "So let's do it, together."

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"silly" or "girl." Long ago, bakery became thirteen "silly" meant happy or blessed. "Girl" once could instead of twelve. mean any young child, Fun Facts

Ever wondered why a Bakers Dozen means

thirteen?

hen I was a child, I often wondered why a "baker's dozen" meant thirteen instead of twelve. It seemed odd to add one more when a dozen should be enough.

Yet, this old phrase holds a story from long ago. In medieval England, strict laws governed the price and weight of bread. Bakers feared harsh punishments if they sold short. To stay safe, they gave one extra loaf. Over time, this habit turned into a tradition. That's how a dozen from the

While that's the known tale, there are other bits that make it more fun. Imagine a time with no supermarkets. Bread was made by hand, and rules were strict. If a baker sold even a bit less than promised, they risked heavy fines, or worse.

To please buyers and stay on the right side of the law, they added an extra loaf. It was a way to show honesty and goodwill. Soon, it stuck. Even today, many think of a baker's dozen when they see thirteen treats in a box.

But why stop at this one phrase? Our English language is rich with odd terms. Some words shift meaning over time, much like how "awful" once meant "full of awe," not bad at all. Or how "nice" once hinted at foolishness. Words are alive. They change shape and sense as we use them. Just as bakers once added a loaf, we add new layers to old words. Think about words like

boy or girl. Over centuries, words gain and lose shades of meaning, like colors fading or brightening in the sun. Each generation sculpts language to fit its needs.

A baker's dozen is one small example of how life shapes speech. The world of bread and laws nudged us to say thirteen when we meant twelve plus one. Now, it stands as a quirky reminder of a distant time. Yet the English tongue is full of such shifts. If we pay attention, we'll find countless stories hidden inside old words and phrases.

In this way, learning about a baker's dozen can spark a larger love of words. It helps us see language not as a dry tool, but as a living, breathing thing that ties us to our past while guiding us into the future.



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ome of Uganda's universities have concluded their end of year exams at least for their undergraduate students. Some students have taken to social media to celebrate this milestone. It is not every day that one gets to complete their education. In Uganda, many have been studying since they were three years old or younger. That is averagely 20 years of classrooms. Phew!

Anything that takes 20 years to accomplish should be celebrated. And those in Uganda who have managed to complete their education are the lucky few. The majority of kids who start their primary education don't get the opportunity to sit their primary leaving exams. Numbers continue dropping in secondary education and other levels.

The end of exams comes for most of these students at the precipice of something new —disruptive technologies like artificial

intelligence that is changing the world. Some jobs will have to go but many others will be created. There are about 400,000 young people that enter the job market in Uganda every year. It is a dauting task to find work but it is also an opportunity for many young people to define their future.

The end of final year exams and the graduation ceremony in months ahead doesn't mean the end of learning. Formal education for many may be over but lifelong learning starts right now. Life is about learning something new all the time and being able to adapt to the realities that are thrown our way.

university or other education is finding a job. There is a lot of talk about the disruptive nature of artificial intelligence but machines and such technologies won't entirely replace humans. Those who will succeed are those who will learn how to work alongside them. But there are still other things that fresh graduates

looking for a job in Uganda must embrace. They are equally important or even more critical than even some of the digital skills.

Talent alone or high academic qualifications may open the door for you but it won't keep you in the room. That is why many



times people with average talent succeed over the most talented ones. Virtues that keep average people flying.

At university, there is perhaps no course unit on virtues. Stuff like honesty. Yet it is a key ingredient of success. How many people promise to do something and do it? There is an increasing

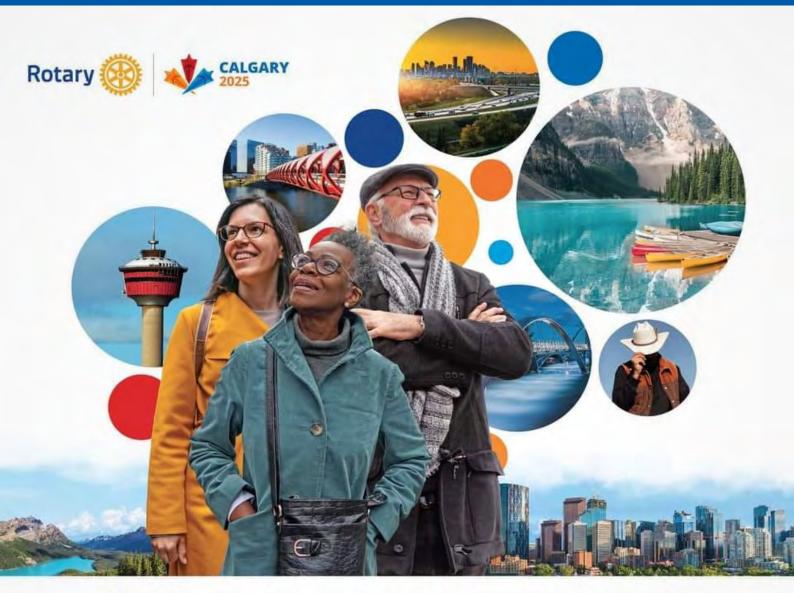
